State legislative update

- HB 300/SB 473 Governor's Budget Request
- HB 1231 Establish a special fund for fines collected for speeding in a school zone. Includes red light imaging detector systems installed in school zones
- HB 1471 Add a \$5 fee to certification of registration to be deposited in Safe Routes to School Fund
- SB 864/ HB 683 Establishes and appropriates funds for student transportation coordinators positions within the Department of Education to strengthen student transportation services across the State.
- SB 1124 Retail delivery safety fee. Fees deposited in Safe Routes to School fund.
- SB 1196 Rideshare fee. Fees collected placed in safe routes to school fund.
- SB 1508 clarification bill
- SB 1664 Requires the State to prioritize the installation of photo red light imaging detector systems in school zones if the State establishes a photo red light imaging detector system. Requires proceeds of fines collected for disregarding a steady red signal pursuant to a photo red light imaging detector system installed in a school zone to be deposited into the Safe Routes to School Program Special Fund.

Next steps

- Adoption of <u>Final Report to Legislature</u>
- Approval of permitted interactions for SRTS plan scope action
- Approval of permitted interactions for SRTS staff recommendation action
- Addition and Approval of state projects into 2025 Proposed Project Pipeline List.
- Addition of evaluation criterion that adds priority to existing projects.
- Approval of permitted interactions for project funding recommendations action.

Approve report formally

- Deputy AG mtg on March 4th recommends formal action.
- Still may have to vote on specific funding but makes our intentions very clear.

Action - The Committee adopts the Final Report to Legislature (December 2024) as its formal set of recommendations.

Develop a comprehensive statewide SRTS plan and program

- IDIQ is not available (either no capacity or not in scope).
- Draft scope ready
- Requires some changes post-HDOT review:
 - changes from original plan as they are premature or outside law's mandate for Committee (administrative support, technical assistance)
 - Deliverables schedule
 - Scope detail
 - Evaluation criteria
- Next Steps The Chair will finalize the scope with Hawaii DOT and bring to Committee vote for approval at April's meeting.

Invest in a strong network of SRTS staff

- SRTS staff funding lapse as of 6/30/2025 for one county, one county missing SRTS coordinator
- Deputy AG mtg on March 4th
 - Certain pieces of the law are appropriate for a HDOT program manager position,
 - Prioritizes existing over future actions.
 - 6 positions focus on the lapsing funds for C&C and then HDOT program manager
- Action The Committee requests that C&C will present a funding request for the C&C SRTS coordinator, if needed.
- Action The Committee requests HDOT explore the SRTS program coordinator position and present options at April's meeting

Fund projects

- Deputy AG mtg on March 4th flagged the need to prioritize current/existing work, supported specific actions to clarify funding recommendations.
- Fund existing county-based SRTS plans, programs, and projects (pipeline list in report to Legislature)
- Authorize state list of projects for inclusion into pipeline list
- Add priority for existing projects to evaluation criteria
- Evaluate current projects to move some forward for recommendation to Hawaii DOT.
- Launch process to solicit and evaluate new project proposals (revised to match report to legislature)

Fund projects recommendation

- Action The Committee recommends integrating the state project list into the full project list in the Report to Legislature, together referred to as the "2025 Project Pipeline List". Addition and Approval of state projects into 2025 Proposed Project Pipeline List.
- Action The Committee recommends adding one additional evaluation criterion that priority be given to existing projects, as per Act 244 (2023). It should be integrated into the evaluation approach in the Final Report to Legislature as it is utilized by the approve permitted interaction group (see next action).
- Action The Committee recommends establishing a permitted interaction group under §92-2.5 (b) to evaluate and
 make recommendations to the Committee and HDOT for SRTS funding. The permitted interaction group will use the
 current project proposal evaluation form and criteria to work with project sponsors to submit projects for evaluation
 by the group, specifically for the available \$6 million. At least one project in each county and state will be
 recommended from the "2025 Project Pipeline List".

HRS §92-2.5 (b) Two or more members of a board, but less than the number of members which would constitute a quorum for the board, may be assigned to:
(1) Investigate a matter relating to the official business of their board; provided that:

- (A) The scope of the investigation and the scope of each member's authority are defined at a meeting of the board;
- (B) All resulting findings and recommendations are presented to the board at a meeting of the board; an
- (C) Deliberation and decisionmaking on the matter investigated, if any, occurs only at a duly noticed meeting of the board held subsequent to the meeting at which the findings and recommendations of the

investigation were presented to the board; or

(2) Present, discuss, or negotiate any position which the board has adopted at a meeting of the board; provided that the assignment is made and the scope of each member's authority is defined at a meeting of the board prior to the presentation, discussion or negotiation.
