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“The gas tax is no longer doing its job. Help us by joining the conversation on a new way to pay for our roads.” – **Jade Butay, HDOT**

Hawaii is aiming for 100% clean energy by 2045. Already, there are more fuel-efficient cars on our roads, including some electric ones. Great news, but there’s a downside. The per-gallon gas tax is becoming less effective at funding our needed road and bridge upkeep and improvements, because we are using less gas.

Instead of the gas tax, might a system where we pay for how many miles we drive—a road usage charge—work better? Hawaii, along with other states, is taking a careful look. This Driving Report shows how a road usage charge would affect you based on the vehicle you recently had inspected.

# Frequently asked questions

<b>What is a road usage charge?</b>	A road usage charge (RUC) is a way to pay for roads and bridges based on how many miles we drive, instead of a per-gallon tax at the gas pump.
<b>How would my mileage be recorded?</b>	HDOT is considering different ways to record mileage. A simple way to record mileage is at your annual vehicle safety inspection. Other possible methods include smartphone apps and plug-in devices that can report mileage more frequently.
<b>Would I have to pay both a gas tax and a road usage charge?</b>	No. The state is considering the road usage charge as a replacement to the gas tax, not in addition to the gas tax.
<b>Would different types of cars be charged different rates?</b>	Possibly. The per-mile rate could vary based on vehicle weight, emissions, and other factors. This gas tax doesn't have this flexibility. The per-mile rate on this Driving Report is the same for all cars and is based on what the average car pays in gas tax today.
<b>Have other states adopted a road usage charge?</b>	Many other states are interested in developing their own programs. Washington, Oregon, and California have started investigating a road usage charge in recent years. There is a multi-state research collective of state departments of transportation examining road usage charging as a regional policy in the Western United States.
<b>When will a road usage charge happen?</b>	This is only a test. Hawaii is looking at road usage charges as one possible approach. Your feedback will help determine the state's recommendations on how to pay for our roads and bridges.

## Explore how it might work

For each mile you drive, you would be charged a very small amount of money—less than two cents. This rate provides funding for both county and state roads in Hawaii. Because a road usage charge is still being investigated, the cost-per-mile rates are only estimates.

<b>Total miles driven</b>		<b>10,000</b>
<b>Potential charge rate per mile*</b>	<b>x</b>	<b>\$0.016</b>
<b>Total road usage charge</b>	<b>=</b>	<b>\$160</b>

\*State charge at \$0.008 & county charge at \$0.008 per mile
